Kiddush

There will be a Shul-sponsored Kiddush following Tefillah this week.



(4) We abstain from the consumption of meat (including poultry) and wine. These foods are symbolic of the Temple service, and are generally expressions of celebration and joy.

On Shabbat, meat and wine are permitted. This applies also to any other seudat mitzvah — for example, at a Brit Milah or at the completion of a tractate of Talmud.

Wine from Havdallah should be given to a child to drink.

(5) We refrain from wearing newly-laundered garments, or laundering clothes. If the "freshness" has been taken out of a garment prior to the Nine Days, it may be worn. Fresh clothes may be worn for Shabbat.

The clothing of small children, which gets soiled frequently, may be laundered during The Nine Days.

Clothes may not be laundered even if done in preparation for after Tisha B'Av, or even if done by a non-Jew.

(6) We do not bathe for pleasure.

It is permitted to bathe in order to remove dirt or perspiration, or for medical reasons. This may be done only in cool water. Furthermore, the body should be washed in parts, rather than all at one time.

Bathing in warm water is permitted on Friday in honor of Shabbat.

Summary of Halachot: The Nine Days

The period commencing with Rosh Chodesh Av (this coming Wednesday) and culminating with Tisha B'Av is called "The Nine Days." During this time, a stricter level of mourning is observed (beyond that which began on Shiva Asar B'Tamuz), in accordance with the Talmudic dictum (Ta'anit 26): "When the month of Av begins, we reduce our joy."

(1) We avoid purchasing items that bring great joy.

(2) We suspend home improvements, or the planting of trees and flowers.

(3) We avoid litigation with non-Jews, since fortune is inauspicious at this time.

CUSTOMS OF THE three weeks

Q: Is it true that only Ashkenazim observe the Availut of The Three Weeks, while Sephardim only begin Availut on Rosh Chodesh Av?

A: While it is true that the Ashkenazim are more stringent than our holy Sephardic brothers during this time period, the latter

DO observe some Halachot beginning with the 17th of Tamuz. For example, they omit reciting Shehechyanu during The Three Weeks, and they avoid certain activities that could lead to danger, such as walking alone in certain areas.

With God's help, we will have the Mikdash speedily in our days, and will no longer observe these days of Availut!

All for One

In reply to the request from the children of Gad and the children of Reuven to settle on the other side of the river Jordan, Moshe Rabeinu replies with the words האחיכם יבאו למלחמה ואתם תשבו פה – will your brothers go to war while you sit here?

We usually understand Moshe's reply as a reprimand to these tribes for attempting to escape sharing the burden of fighting by settling in Transjordan and not engaging in battle for Eretz Yisrael with the rest of the People.

However, **Rabbi Yehonatan Eibeshutz**, zt"l, places a slightly different slant on Moshe's words. Moshe explained to the tribes of Reuven and Gad that if they think they will be able to dwell in peace and security while their brothers are fighting, they are mistaken!

האחיכם יבאו למלחמה – while your brothers are engaged in war
ואתם תשבו פה – do you honestly think that you will be able to sit in peace and tranquillity here?

An attack on one Jew is an attack on all of us. The enemy understands that we are all connected with one beating heart, so if they attack part of the people now, it will only be a matter of time before they come for the other.

When Jews are attacked, threatened, or oppressed anywhere around the globe, we must not say that we feel sorry for them, but at least it is not happening to us!

We are all one; therefore, far from such incidents being foreign and removed, they affect us all...because we are all one!¹

(Additionally, Moshe and Aharon died in the desert due to their actions at the "waters of Meriva" - Bamidbar 20:12.)
